She has led multiple strategic planning processes and organizational development efforts for public lands partners and conservation organizations across the western United States.

Ayotte was born and raised in Southern Oregon and has been in Central Oregon for the past six years. She holds a bachelor of arts in history from the University of Washington, a master of arts in museum management and a master of business administration degree in nonprofit management from John F. Kennedy University. She serves on the boards of The Children's Forest of Central Oregon and the Global Leadership Adventures International Foundation, and sits on the Bend Cultural Tourism Fund Commission. Ayotte will succeed Brad Chalfant, the Land Trust's executive director for 25 years.

Tim Carroll, who prioritized superior, student-centered learning as dean of the Eberhardt School of Business at the University of the Pacific, will become Sara Hart Kimball Dean of **Oregon State University's College of Business** effective July 30.

Carroll has served as a dean and a professor of management at the University of the Pacific in Stockton, California, since 2018. At Pacific, he led the development of a new college strategic plan, increased student retention and enrollment, launched programs to meet the needs of students and employers, created events to enhance communication between the college and students, and expanded fundraising.

Prior to joining the University of the Pacific, Carroll served as associate dean of executive development at the University of South Carolina's Darla Moore School of Business.

At South Carolina, Carroll served as president of Corporate Solutions LLC, a private arm of the business school that fosters corporate partnerships to address employer talent needs and promotes student experiential learning projects. Additionally, he led the school's nationally ranked professional MBA program, leveraging technology and a blended learning approach to deliver classes across seven sites in two states.

Before working at South Carolina, Carroll was a member of the faculty at Georgia Tech, where he developed innovative academic courses and cultivated external partnerships.

Carroll's scholarly expertise focuses on competitive strategy and organization. He has consulted and delivered executive development programs to companies in the aerospace, apparel, banking, computer, construction, energy, engineering services, media, mining, petroleum, pharmaceutical, railroad, restaurant and telecommunication industries, as well as several government agencies. He holds a Ph.D. in management from Duke University. He has also served on many community, nonprofit and business development advisory or board roles.

Carroll replaces Jim Coakley, who has served as interim dean of the OSU College of Business since summer 2019. Coakley is also senior associate dean for analytics and operations in the college. He will continue in that role.

Redmond Proficiency Academy (RPA) students **Chaela Baker** and **Harrison Swift** were recently announced as first place winners in the Oregon Mayors Association (OMA) If I Were Mayor contest.

The annual contest gives elementary, middle and high school students the opportunity to explain policies and initiatives they would put in place if they were mayor. Contestant entries are composed of posters, essays and digital media.

Baker, a senior at RPA High School, won first place at the state level in the high school Video category and Swift won first place at the state level in the middle school Essay category.

In her video entry, Baker said increasing recycling opportunities would be one of her major initiatives, even adding a recycling center to Redmond. Baker would also ensure that Redmond city parks were safe and clean.

Swift, a seventh-grader at RPA Middle School, pledged to tackle the issues of homelessness, writing, "I would propose the city build a designated homeless camp, somewhere along Maple Avenue. It would have bunkhouses, an area for tents and a program to help people get jobs. The camp would be built on tax dollars, and would charge its patrons five-ten dollars a night. I think that this would really help homelessness in Redmond (and Oregon as a whole), and could aid the homeless in getting back on their feet."

First place-winning students and their families will be invited to attend the OMA Summer conference in North Bend at the Mill Casino on July 31, to have their prize presented at an awards luncheon. As first place winners, Baker and Swift will both receive \$500 checks.
