WHEN SHOULD I GET TESTED FOR COVID-19?



THE PANDEMIC IS CHANGING, AND SO ARE TESTING GUIDELINES

We want you to know the latest on when to get a laboratory test for COVID-19 to best protect yourself, your family and our community



WHO SHOULD GET TESTED

Individuals with symptoms or exposure who are at high risk for complications or who meet eligibility criteria for COVID-19 therapeutics

- People over age 65
- People over age 12 who:
 - have obesity
 - have diabetes
 - have chronic kidney disease
 - have a heart condition like heart failure, cardiomyopathies or high blood pressure
 - have Sickle Cell disease
 - have a developmental condition like cerebral palsy
 - use daily medication for asthma or other long-term lung disease
 - have a dependency on medical technology such as a ventilator or feeding tube
 - are pregnant
 - are taking medications that weaken the immune system
- Individuals with moderate to severe illness who require medical care
- Individuals who:
 - live or work in a congregate residential setting (long-term care facility, adult foster home, behavioral health facility, residential treatment facility, homeless shelter, transitional housing, group homes)
 - are associated with agricultural or food chain facilities
 - K-12 educational settings or early-learning facilities
- Symptomatic individuals with no known close contact with someone with COVID-19 in the past 10 days



WHO MAY NOT NEED TESTING

- Family / household members who have been exposed to a COVID-19 positive household/family member do not require their own test unless they are medically fragile or high-risk (e.g., unvaccinated) and may require early treatment
- People with mild symptoms who **do not** require medical care (isolate at home while recovering for at least 5 days and until 24 hours without fever and after symptoms have improved)
- People with a positive home COVID-19 test **do not** need another confirmatory test
- People with a positive COVID-19 test from clinic or other testing site do not need a confirmatory test or a "test of cure" or negative test to return to work/school
- Symptomatic people with a negative clinic test or two negative home antigen tests taken 24-hours apart within 3-5 days of illness
